7. Board Chair Report

Chairperson Hunter again thanked the Board for their support in his election to Chairperson, and stated he had no items to address. Mr. Carl Rice brought forward information he recently heard related to practices in other cities revolving around opioid use and addiction. Following board member discussion/debate regarding practices being reported in the news related to

the opioid epidemic, Chairperson Hunter stated the issue is a very important topic, and has made sides open for debate, but asked the Board move to the next item on the agenda.

8. Deputy Director Report

Ms. Amanda Horgan provided a review of the report included in board packets, titled Summary PA2 Use of Funds by County and Provider. She indicated this information is provided for the Board's information and review only, and asked questions be directed to her or Dr. Meier.

Mr. John McKellar requested clarification related to Saginaw County listings on the report. He indicated his belief was those entities were receiving funding via block grants, not via PA2 funding. Ms. Horgan stated she would investigate that on Mr. McKellar's behalf and follow-up with him as necessary.

Ms. Kim Thalison inquired if there could be a reporting related to longevity of funds moving forward. Ms. Horgan stated the MSHN team would research PA2 previous history, and what is anticipated related to future funding. This information will be added as an agenda item for the next Board Meeting.

He thanked Mr. Bruce Caswell for his strong words and efforts over the past year. He also stated we owe Lieutenant Governor Calley a debt for his support; slowing the action down, supporting the rights of individuals we serve and allowing individuals and the families of individuals receiving services to be a big part of the dialogue. Mr. Pinter stated the MSHN organization, including its councils and committees, are supportive of offering alternatives built on state/county partnership and is optimistic the legislation is going in a direction that will respect that.

Chairperson Hunter thanked Mr. Pinter for his comments.

13. Board Member Comment

Mr. Leonard Strouse discussed an item related to out-of-state investors who have recently been in contact with City Managers in Clare County related to procuring a location for medical marijuana grow facilities. Dr. Meier encouraged Mr. Strouse to advise the City Manager and others involved to talk to their local prevention professionals on this issue.



PA 2 HISTORY

Background

- ❖ PA 106 of 1985 is the "state convention facility development act". An Act to impose a state excise tax on persons engaged in the business of providing rooms for dwelling, lodging, or sleeping purposes to transient guests in certain counties;
 - to provide for the levy, assessment, and collection the tax; to provide for the disposition and appropriation of the collections from the tax;
 - to create a convention facility development fund;
 - to authorize the distributions from the fund;
 - to authorize the use of distributions from the tax as security for any bonds, obligations, or other evidences of indebtedness issued to finance convention facilities as provided by law;
 - to prescribe certain other matters relating to bonds, obligations, or other evidences of indebtedness issued for such purposes.
- ❖ PA 107 of 1985 is an Act to impose a specific tax on spirits;
 - to provide for the levy, assessment, and collection of the tax;
 - > to prescribe the powers and duties of the liquor control commission;
 - to provide for the disposition and use of the proceeds of the tax to the convention facility development fund.
- ❖ It was assumed that a tax levied only in Macomb, Oakland and Wayne Counties would be unconstitutional. Therefore, the tax has to be levied on all 83 Michigan Counties even though the tax is only necessary to support a project in the three southeast Michigan Counties.
 - > To compensate the 80 out-state counties for having a liquor tax increase of 4%, it was politically expedient to return the out-state tax to the counties from which it was collected.
- ❖ Public Acts 106 and 107 will sunset on December 31, 2015.
- ❖ PA 2 of 1986 amends the General Property Tax Act to require counties to include in their "truth in taxation" calculations any payments received from the state as a result of distributions from the convention facility development fund.

Section 11 of PA 2 of 1986

If the sum of a county's operating property tax levy for the ensuing fiscal year plus the county's distribution to be received pursuant to section 10 of the state convention facility development act exceeds the product of the county's state equalized value for the ensuing fiscal year times the greater of the county's base tax rate or prior years' operating millage rate, then an amount equal to the lesser of 50% of the excess of 50% of the state convention facility development act distribution shall be used for substance treatment programs within the county. The proceeds received by the taxing unit shall be distributed to the coordinating agency designated for that county pursuant to section 6226 of Act No. 368 of the Public Acts of 1978, being section 333.6226 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, to be used for substance abuse prevention and treatment programs in the county from which the proceeds originated.

- Starting October 1, 1985 the 4% liquor tax increase started to be collected at the Michigan Department of Treasury. The first annual distribution took place in 1986.
- ❖ PA 72 of 2007 Amends the State Convention Facility Development Act to permit a distribution from the Convention Facility Development Fund to the General Fund in FY 2006-2007 that were collected during the previous fiscal year (\$35 million with balance collected going back to counties for intended distribution).
 - ➤ The transfer would represent a one-time revenue gain for the General Fund. Beginning October 1, 2007 and each year thereafter, from the revenue collected during the previous quarter, after distributing the monthly payments the state treasurer shall make quarterly distributions instead of an annual distribution from revenues collected during the previous fiscal year.
 - The balance left over from the \$35 million reduction amounted to \$814,543 being distributed to all 83 counties excluding the City of Detroit.
- ❖ PA 553 of 2008 extends the tax levy to December 31, 2039.

Schedule of Distributions to the Counties

- Starting in 2008 the distribution of the PA 2 funds went from an annual payment that was made in March based on calendar year collections to quarterly payments based on the State's fiscal year.
 - ➤ January March: distribution goes first to the repayment of the bond. If there are funds left over, distribution from Treasury will occur the last day in April;
 - April June: Distribution from Treasury is scheduled for the last day in July;
 - > July September: Distribution from Treasury is scheduled for the last day in October;
 - October December: Distribution from Treasury is scheduled for the last day in January.

Opinions:

- ❖ Attorney General's Opinion 4841 dated October 24, 1974 states "such amounts as are received from the state lose their identity as such when received by the county." So this means PA 2 dollars are "local" dollars. (Per a request from MASACA to Attorney General Office 11/26/1986)
- ❖ Attorney General's Opinion dated June 30, 1992 indicates that PA 2 fund cannot be used for CA administration. The funds are to only be used to fund "hands-on" services of licensed programs. The authority or responsibility to assure compliance with MCL 211.24e(11) lies with the County Board of Commissioners, pursuant to MCL 211.37; MSA 7.55 and/or the county treasurer, pursuant to MCL 48.40; MSA 5.686. (Per memo to Vernice Davis Anthony, Director, MDPH from the Department of Attorney General, Robert J. Taube, Assistant in Charge, Public Health Division)
- Attorney General's Opinion dated July 16, 2004 indicates "There is no discretion in the statute; the money must be distribute to the designated coordinating agency." The opinion also states that PA 2 funding may not be used to pay for the coordinating agency's administrative expenses. (Per letter to Janet Olszewski, Director, MDCH from The Department of Attorney General, Carol L. Issacs, Chief Deputy Attorney General)

PA2 (Liquor Tax) Funding Consideration Criteria

The following criteria apply to programs, projects, initiatives, and services funded in whole or in part with dollars derived from county PA2 liquor tax funds and administered by Mid-State Health Network. MSHN shall apply the criteria when making PA2 fund use recommendations to the SUD Oversight Policy Board.

1) Licensure (Treatment or Prevention):

- a. Is required if the proposed provider intends to deliver a regulated treatment or prevention service for which state law requires licensing.
 - Mid-State Health Network (MSHN) may provide PA2 funding contingent upon the provider achieving licensing, where required, within a reasonable stated timeframe.
- b. Is not required if the proposed provider intends to deliver a service or support that directly or indirectly benefits the health or wellness of individuals or families with substance use problems or disorders, prevents substance use, misuse, abuse or addiction, or improves community health related to substance use, misuse, abuse, or addiction.

2) Accreditation:

- a. Is required if the proposed provider intends to deliver services that are resourced in part by PA2 *and* from Block Grant, Medicaid and/or Healthy Michigan Plan funds.
 - The State of Michigan, on request of and with sound rationale by MSHN, may, in its sole discretion, temporarily waive the accreditation requirement in order to provide a reasonable time period for the provider to achieve accreditation.
- b. Is not required if the proposed provider intends to deliver services that are exclusively funded under PA2.

3) Community Support:

Where local substance abuse prevention or treatment coalitions exist, the coalition has been consulted by the proposed provider and has taken a position in support of the proposed program, service, or product.

4) Service and Performance Considerations:

- a. **Necessity**: Does the program meet a service gap? How does it fit with MSHN's Network Adequacy Assessment?
- b. **Efficacy**: Can the provider demonstrate results/positive outcomes from previous work?
- c. Quality of program: Is the new program evidence-based?
- d. **Finance**: Are funding streams appropriate and available for the service?
- e. Scale: Is there capacity to expand regionally or replicate the service?
- f. Access: Can any resident of the MSHN region access the service, even out of area?
- g. **Sustainability**: After initial funding, will the provider need ongoing support or is this request for start-up costs?
- h. Credentialing: Does the provider meet all necessary licensing, certification and accreditation standards?
- i. **Regional Consistency:** If the rationale for the service works in one community, will we be obliged to offer the same region-wide? Or is there local specificity that makes this fit here better?
- j. Measuring success: How will success be determined? Does baseline data exist?

5) Funding consideration will not be provided for:

- a. Marketing, advertising, or any proposed cost that would be considered administrative. Administrative cost support is prohibited by PA2.
- b. Transitional housing programs that are not encouraging/affiliated with SUD treatment programs.
