June/July

MSHN/REGIONAL MATTERS

REMINDER - SUD Oversight Policy Board - Bylaws

Mid-State Health Network is still monitoring any newly proposed legislation prior to presenting any changes to the bylaws. MSHN will present an amendment to the SUD OPB in accordance with Section 7.2 as follows: "These bylaws may be amended by the members of the Board acting in accordance with the voting requirements set forth in Section 4.8. The agenda of the meeting shall set forth a summary of the proposed amendment(s) at *least fourteen (14) days prior to the date of the meeting. An affirmative vote to amend the Bylaws must be approved by the Board of Directors of MSHN.* Any amendment of these bylaws must be consistent with the Michigan law, the Code and the Intergovernmental Contract.

MSHN is planning to present an overview of the SUD Oversight Policy Board Bylaws and review any proposed edits, now expecting to take place in the summer/fall.

REMINDER - 24th Annual Substance Use and Co-Occurring Disorder Conference

The 24th Annual Substance and Co-Occurring Disorder Conference will take place this year on September 10-12, 2023. This year's theme is "Supporting Wellness in Individuals, Communities and Systems". MSHN sponsors board members to participate and provides reimbursement for travel related costs. SUD Oversight Policy Board members interested in attending, should contact myself or Sherry Kletke.

<u>REMINDER – Board Annual Disclosure of Ownership, Controlling Interest, and</u> Criminal Convictions DUE

MSHN is contractually responsible for monitoring ownership and control interests within its provider network and disclosing criminal convictions of any staff member, director, or manager of MSHN, any individual with beneficial ownership of five percent or more, or an individual with an employment, consulting, or other arrangement with MSHN. Therefore, the Oversight Policy Board must complete an annual disclosure statement that ensures MSHNs compliance with the contractual and federal regulations to obtain, maintain, disclose, and furnish required information about ownership and control interests, business transactions, and criminal convictions. If OPB Members have questions about the disclosures or need assistance completing the electronic form, please feel free to reach out to Sherry or myself.

FY23 Substance Use, Gambling and Epidemiology Fiscal Review Results

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services' Substance Use, Gambling and Epidemiology Section staff conducted a fiscal review of the program standards and requirements under Mid-State Health Network's funding. STATE OF MICHIGAN/STATEWIDE ACTIVITIES

New Administrative Rules

The Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA) - Bureau of Community and Health Systems has filed updated Substance Use Disorder Service Programs Administrative Rules on June 26, 2023, to take immediate effect. Notable changes:

- Community Change, Alternatives, Information, Training (CAIT) meaning Prevention license is still in effect.
- Assessment [Screening and assessment, referral, follow-up services (SARF)] programs no longer require a SUD services program license.
- Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) programs prescribing buprenorphine and naltrexone to 100 and more recipients no longer require a SUD services program license.
- Comparable requirements to federal guidelines for take-homes in Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs).

MDHHS Substance Use, Gambling, and Epidemiology Section is creating guidance for PIHPs around replacement requirements for providers implementing prevention services.

Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) - Seeking Bids to Expand Medications for Opioid Use Disorder Treatment in County Jails

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) is seeking proposals to contract with a project administrator to oversee a project to expand medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD) programs in Michigan county jails.

This project will be funded through opioid settlement funding and seeks to address the significant overdose risks in individuals once they are released from jail by increasing access to MOUD in county jails.

"In Michigan, we are using this long-term funding to support evidence-based programming, including for treatment providers, recovery supports, harm-reduction strategies, prevention programming and other programs that support individuals with substance use disorders," said MDHHS Director Elizabeth Hertel. "Medications for opioid use disorder has been proven effective to reduce the risk of overdoses, and expanding this program in our county jails is a priority."

Medications for opioid use disorder have been approved by the U.S Food and Drug Administration to treat and prevent relapse for opioid use disorder (OUD).

Research has shown that individuals who are incarcerated are at significant risk of experiencing both non-fatal and fatal overdoses post incarceration. Rhode Island offered all three forms of MOUD in its correctional system, resulting in a nearly two-thirds reduction in statewide opioid overdose deaths.

Once selected, the contracted project administrator will recruit county jails to participate in individualized technical assistance and training to implement or expand access to MOUD. While training and technical assistance needs may vary by participating jails, technical assistance will include:

Implementing or expanding a MOUD continuum-of-care model from jail to release to the community.



- Identifying incarcerated individuals with OUD.
- Providing evidence-based treatment within the jail.
- Establishing reentry to ensure continuity in medication and supportive services after release from incarceration.

Participating county jails will receive a stipend that must be used to cover the costs associated with MOUD programs, such as medications that can cost up to \$1,800 per dose.

Proposals must be submitted electronically through SIGMA Vendor Self Service by 1:55 p.m., Wednesday, Aug. 2. Once logged in to SIGMA, vendors can search for RFP #230000002541 or search Medications for Opioid Use Disorder Implementation in Jail Settings.

FEDERAL/NATIONAL ACTIVITIES

The Department of Health and Human Services Distributes \$47.8 Million in Grant Funding for Programs

Expanding Access to Medications for Opioid Use Disorder, Addressing Other Facets of Overdose and

Substance

On Wednesday, July 19, 2023, The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through its Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), announced awards in five grant programs devoted to combating multiple facets of substance misuse and the nation's overdose epidemic. The grant awards total up to \$47.8 million.

The grant awards facilitate ongoing efforts throughout the nation in prevention, treatment, recovery support and harm reduction – the pillars of the HHS Overdose Prevention Strategy. The Overdose Prevention Strategy helps advance the Biden-Harris Administration's National Drug Control Strategy, which delivers on the call to action in President Biden's Unity Agenda for a whole-of-government approach to beat the overdose epidemic.

The five grant programs are:

- Medication-Assisted Treatment-Prescription Drug and Opioid Addiction (MAT-PDOA) Grant Program, distributing 21 awards totaling up to \$18.4 million: This program helps expand or enhance access to Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD). It is expected that this program will help to 1) increase the number of individuals with OUD receiving MOUD; and 2) decrease illicit opioid use and prescription opioid misuse.
- 2. Emergency Department Alternatives to Opioids Demonstration Program, distributing 15 awards and a total of up to \$7.4 million: This program develops and implements alternatives to opioids for pain management in hospitals and emergency department (ED) settings. Strategies should include innovative approaches to the management of pain including team-based approaches that could be initiated in ED settings where many individuals with such conditions seek acute care. Those approaches then could be continued in other organizational settings such as primary care or specialty pain management settings.
- 3. **Sober Truth on Preventing Underage Drinking Act (STOP Act) program**, distributing 50 awards and a total of up to \$3 million: This program prevents and reduces alcohol use among youth and young adults ages 12-20 in communities throughout the United States. The program aims to: (1) address norms



regarding alcohol use by youth, (2) reduce opportunities for underage drinking, (3) create changes in underage drinking enforcement efforts, (4) address penalties for underage use, and/or (5) reduce negative consequences associated with underage drinking (e.g., motor vehicle crashes, sexual assaults). In addition, awardees will build on strategic plans that were developed under a Drug Free Communities award utilizing the strategic prevention framework model, which aims to address underage drinking behaviors.

- 4. Adult Reentry Program, distributing 34 awards totaling up to \$13.6 million: This program expands substance use disorder (SUD) treatment and related recovery and reentry services to sentenced adults in the criminal justice system who have SUDs and/or co-occurring substance use and mental disorders adults who are returning to their families and community following a period of incarceration in state and local facilities including prisons, jails, or detention centers. Maintaining treatment and recovery during this transition period is crucial to help prevent overdose, particularly for people whose opioid tolerance has decreased as they have received treatment while incarcerated.
- 5. **State Pilot Grant Program for Treatment for Pregnant and Postpartum Women**, distributing six awards that total up to \$5.4 million: This program enhances flexibility in the use of funds designed to: 1) support family-based services for pregnant and postpartum women with a primary diagnosis of an SUD, including OUDs; 2) help state substance abuse agencies address the continuum of care, including services provided to pregnant and postpartum women in nonresidential-based settings; and 3) promote a coordinated, effective and efficient state system managed by state substance abuse agencies by encouraging new approaches and models of service delivery.

OPB Operational Report August 2023 Q4 July-September

Several Clinical Team functions and activities are ongoing year-round while others are specific to requirements of that quarter's place in the fiscal year cycle or situation-specific demands prompted by new federal, state, or local mandates or regulations, shifts in epidemiological trends (e.g., COVID surges or rise in stimulant use), etc. The activities below are separated accordingly.

Prevention

- Supported distribution of \$400,000 in SOR-3 funds for SUD prevention coalition mini-grants for OEND and harm reduction activities and supplies
- Continuation of streaming TV commercial media campaign for problem gambling
- The MSHN region had 93 Synar (Youth Tobacco Act) compliance checks completed, with 13 sales made.
 This is a 13.98% Retailer Violation Rate (RVR) for our region, which is very good! The state's overall RVR
 needs to be under 20% in order to keep our full federal funding for SUD services. The state has not
 reported their overall rate at this time.
- FY23 Prevention and Community Recovery provider desk audit cycle is in progress and will wrap up in September.
- Finalized FY24 Annual Planning with providers and our internal teams
- Updated Prevention sections in contract and Provider Manual for FY24
- Research and development of an MDHHS SUD Strategic Plan for FY24-26.
- Began working with MDHHS on update to the Michigan Prevention Data System (MPDS), which is the
 software our providers use for activity reporting and tracking. The new system is expected to be ready for
 testing in FY24, and ready for full use beginning in FY25.
- Began planning annual Prevention Conference for MSHN-region Prevention and Community Recovery providers for 2024. Working with Prevention Network to host the training in 2024.
- Began planning for funding from MDHHS' FDA Tobacco Section related to Tobacco Retailer Licensing education for state and local stakeholders
- Ongoing planning for grant projects and spending in FY23, including QPR suicide prevention training, cannabis education, and gambling prevention media campaigns
- Inter-regional coordination ongoing through Prevention Coordinators around the state
- Review of prevention providers' entries into MPDS (Michigan Prevention Data System) where prevention providers log their activities, persons served, etc.
- Provision of technical assistance and training to existing providers on best practices for prevention and on how to document those in MPDS
- Attending coalition meetings across Region 5's 21 counties.
- Continued implementation of FY21-23 SUD Strategic Plan.

Treatment

• LARA SUD Administrative Rules went into effect on 6/26/2023. SUD clinical team updated FY24 contracts, SUD provider manual, and QAPI review tools to reflect new/revised rules.



- Finalize data review and contract recommendations for FY24 for treatment and recovery providers.
- Approximately \$143,000 of grant funds utilized to support provider evidence-based materials requests for prevention, treatment, and recovery.
- Approximately \$27,000 approved at July BOD meeting to support medication lock boxes for individuals engaged in MAT and recovery housing.
- Complete and finalize MDHHS SUD Strategic Plan for FY24-26.
- Support data review for Equity Upstream Learning Collaborative providers.
- Continued support for value-based pilot for Project ASSERT with three regional providers.
- RFP site opened in Greenville, Montcalm County with Samaritas for ASAM 1.0 and 2.1 LOC outpatient services with MAT on 7-19-2023.
- Opioid Health Home (OHH) in Region 5 at Victory Clinical Services Saginaw currently has 215 individuals enrolled and growing daily. MSHN evaluating expansion of Health Home Partners (HHPs) for FY24.
- SUD quarterly provider meeting planned for 9/21/2023.
- Clinical team planning to attend the MDHHS SUD and Co-occurring Conference on September 11-12, 2023.
- Narcan Vending Machines currently approved for Eaton, Ingham, Tuscola, Ionia, Jackson, Gratiot, and Ingham counties with SOR-3 grant funds. Additional machine for Hillsdale County approved in July 2023.
- Planning and coordination of training opportunities for SUD provider network for summer/fall of 2023.
 This includes Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and LGBTQ+ trainings. Training information will be released in the weekly constant contact newsletter.
- Participation and support for internal IDEA workgroup for DEI initiatives.
- Monitoring and assisting providers with ASAM Designation process with MDHHS which is now part of the MiCAL system online.
- Monitoring of Public Health Emergency (PHE) unwind with MDHHS to support providers and individuals in services with guidance.
- Ongoing support of technical assistance needs with SUD treatment providers and CAP Implementation Reviews for two providers.
- Continued Treatment Team attendance at prevention community coalition meetings.
- Ongoing evaluation of opportunities to expand services for specialty populations of older adults, adolescents, veterans and military families.
- Coordinate and facilitate regional Recovery workgroup, ROSC meetings, regional MAT workgroup meetings, regional WSS workgroup meetings, regional WM/residential workgroup, and new outpatient provider meetings.

Additional Activities in July - September:

- Oversight and coordination of SUD prevention and treatment teams and all activities listed above
- Ongoing coordination with statewide SUDS Directors
- Addressing provider best practice issues like group size in residential settings, etc.
- The *Equity Upstream* virtual lecture series concluded on June 14th with Dr. Larke Huang from SAMHSA's Office of Behavioral Health Equity and a panel of University of Michigan experts. All four lectures are now available for viewing on MSHN's website here.
- The pilot group in MSHN's *Equity Upstream* Learning Collaborative (LC) includes 8 MSHN-contracted providers and includes multiple levels of care (residential, outpatient, MAT/methadone providers), recovery housing, a peer-led community recovery organization and a police dept. doing post-overdose community-based outreach. Work is ongoing as providers review data. LC members will implement plans and share outcomes for broader regional application.

THREE-YEAR (FY24-26) STRATEGIC PLAN FOR SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER (SUD) PREVENTION, TREATMENT & RECOVERY SERVICES

Background:

When MSHN absorbed oversight of SUD services in 2015, we inherited a strategic plan that was developed previously by the three sub-regional entities that merged under MSHN's umbrella. MDHHS did not require a new plan for several years thereafter so MSHN's first three-year strategic plan was developed in 2020 for FY21-23 and is here on MSHN's website. That plan was developed as the COVID pandemic was overwhelming health care systems around the country and globally. MSHN incorporated and anticipated what it could based on the changing landscape of health care. For FY24-26, MDHHS has provided a detailed guidance document as to what each region needs to include in their plan. Based on that guidance and the post-pandemic new normal, MSHN will be updating its FY21-23 to reflect current conditions.
