	1	Peer Recovery Coach in the Jail	During the month of August, 32 individuals were seen by the peer recovery coach in jail, home, or community settings. Six people were opened to the RSAT program. Two individuals returned to the community after completing inpatient substance use treatment. One individual returned home after being released from jail. Of those individuals seen by the peer recovery coach this month, only 8 were living in the community. Twenty-four were incarcerated. This speaks to the importance of the relationship the recovery coach is able to develop while participants are in jail. The number of individuals referred to employment opportunities is in part due to the GEMS program through Michigan Works for individuals with child support orders.

The billboards and OTT ads from the first expansion phase with the individual in recovery from Midland continued through the month. The next expansion phase with the women in recovery from Cass City and Jackson had all the media go live in July and is running through the end of September.

	1	Street Medicine Program Development	During August, this provider continued building the infrastructure necessary to expand Street Medicine, overdose prevention, outreach, and community-based services throughout the Bay and Saginaw region. Their mobile unit was delivered to the office and is now operational, serving the community four days per week. The team is utilizing the unit to expand mobile overdose prevention services, participate in community outreach activities, and increase access to services for individuals who may not otherwise engage in traditional service settings. This provider also prepared a dedicated outreach vehicle for deployment to the Saginaw team. The vehicle is now operational four days per week and supports outreach activities throughout the region. Having a dedicated vehicle has increased the team's capacity to provide mobile overdose prevention, engagement, education, and connections to additional community-based services. During August, this provider continued preparing the new office for full operation. Supplies were ordered, the space was organized, and final preparations began to ensure the office is community-ready. The team also began preparing for a visit from Senator Chedrick Greene to introduce him to their work in the Great Lakes Bay Region and share plans for the office, Street Medicine, overdose prevention, and other community-based services. Staff participated in several community outreach activities during August, including National Night Out and International Overdose Awareness Day. The team also continued developing relationships with community partners and preparing to expand educational programming for college students and other community members. Outreach included contacting area colleges and schools and communicating with local medical providers regarding potential educational and training opportunities. They also provided educational rack cards to HealthSource Pathways to increase awareness of available services and strengthen referral connections. They continued educating partners, community stakeholders, and residents about available services and emerging initiatives throughout the Great Lakes Bay Region. They continued expanding community access to naloxone having distributed 16 cases during August.

	1	Transportation	During the month of August, this provider's transportation program was able to provide 119 rides to 17 unique individuals. Of those rides, they transported 11 individuals directly to SUD residential treatment and SUD crisis centers, such as the Jackson Engagement Center, Sacred Heart in Richmond, Hope House in Jonesville, Cedar Roots Recovery in Mason, Henry Ford Addiction Recovery Center in Jackson, and Meridian Health Services in Waterford. Specifically, out of these rides, the transportation specialist assisted in the release of 5 individuals directly from the Jackson County Jail and Hillsdale County Jail and transported them to SUD treatment facilities. They provided 38 rides to intensive outpatient services to Family Service and Children's Aid and Henry Ford Addiction Recovery Center. There were 66 rides provided to MOUD services at the Victory Clinic in Jackson, including routine doctors' visits with the MOUD provider. They provided 4 rides to mental health services at Lifeways and local recovery meetings in the community. Also, they distributed 47 one-way bus passes for local city transportation in Jackson County to assist participants with more means of transportation. Out of 124 rides requested, they were able to provide 119 rides in total.
	2	Community Recovery Initiative	During the month of August, this provider gained significant momentum in advancing their Community Recovery Initiative. In August, they delivered two comprehensive training modules. The first, "Words That Heal: Person-First Language", was presented to four Peer Recovery Coaches and strengthened their understanding of person-first language, empathy, active listening, and the vital role coaches play in supporting individuals throughout recovery. The second module, "Amplifying Recovery: Media Literacy and Storytelling", was delivered to five Peer Recovery Coaches. It explored how media shapes public perceptions of substance use disorders and emphasized using local resources and community engagement to reduce stigma and improve recovery outcomes. In addition to these trainings, they conducted an outreach presentation at the Jackson Interfaith Shelter, reaching approximately 10 staff members and participants. The presentation included an introduction to and overview of the community referral form for substance use disorder services, information on community-based SUD resources, an overview of this provider's programs and services, educational content that addresses stigma reduction and increasing awareness surrounding substance use disorder and recovery, and an interactive question-and-answer session that allowed attendees to discuss challenges, resources, and opportunities for collaboration. They continue to strengthen its community engagement efforts and remain committed to its strategic plan of connecting with local leaders through participation in City Council and County Commissioner meetings. In August, they also met twice with local officials at the County Jail to support continued collaboration and outreach. They are pleased to report that they have been placed on the agenda for a City Council meeting in September, providing an additional opportunity to educate community stakeholders about recovery support services and substance use disorder resources.

Huron, Saginaw, Tuscola	1	Transportation	During the month of August, this provider's transportation program continued to show strong progress, with a total of 61 individuals receiving transportation services across the three counties, including 23 first-time riders. One of the most notable areas of growth was in Tuscola County. Additional flyer distribution throughout the county, along with email outreach and continued promotion through the Tuscola Community Connections app, helped increase awareness of the program. As a result, 17 new individuals in Tuscola County utilized transportation services this month, demonstrating that their outreach efforts are successfully connecting more people with this resource. They also saw meaningful participant outcomes. One participant in Huron County shared, "I've been isolating at home, in the middle of nowhere, for the past 4 days and have been having thoughts of using drugs or drinking. I'm so glad I picked up the phone and called because he [the driver for Huron County] was able to come and pick me up and take me to a recovery event that night!" A Tuscola County participant also shared, "I am so appreciative of [this provider] and all they put towards the recovery of others. Between the meetings and transport, they are family." They continue to see the added value of having Peer Recovery Coaches provide transportation. Their Tuscola County driver noted that the one-on-one time during transportation provides an opportunity to build stronger connections with participants, particularly when they learn that their driver is also a person in recovery. Overall, the transportation program continues to make positive progress. Increased outreach is connecting new individuals with transportation services, while the peer-based approach is helping participants access recovery supports and strengthen their connection to the recovery community.
