	1	Peer Recovery Coach in the Jail	During the month of June, 33 individuals were seen by the peer recovery coach in jail, home, or community settings. 7 people were opened to the RSAT program during the month of June, with one additional individual that had been released into the community returning to jail to complete their sentence due to probation violations and another to complete their sentence after being hospitalized. 7 individuals were released into the community and one was released to another jail. Overall, the current population of RSAT individuals seem to have family connections and are motivated to maintain positive relationships. In the past, individuals were often alone and had no one for support.

	1	Street Medicine Program Development	During June, this provider continued building the infrastructure necessary to launch Street Medicine services in the Bay and Saginaw region. A major milestone was the hiring of a full-time staff member dedicated to supporting the implementation and ongoing operations of the Street Medicine program. Their initial efforts have focused on onboarding, community engagement, and helping establish the operational framework needed for program launch. On June 25, they met with the Central Michigan University Street Medicine Team to discuss collaboration and best practices. As a result of that meeting, the CMU team will be joining this provider's team in Saginaw for a field shadowing experience to observe existing outreach operations and identify opportunities for collaboration as Street Medicine services are implemented. Program infrastructure also continued to advance during June.

	1	Transportation	During the month of June, this provider's transportation program has provided 76 rides to 30 unique individuals. Of those rides, they transported 20 individuals directly to SUD and mental health treatment, including residential treatment such as Oakdale Recovery Center in Canton, Cedar Roots Recovery in Mason, Dawn Farm in Ann Arbor, Holden House in Lansing, Sacred Heart in Richmond, Hope House in Jonesville, and Henry Ford Addiction Recovery Center in Jackson, Crisis services at the Jackson Engagement Center and 2 intakes to Lifeways mental health services. They provided 37 rides to intensive outpatient services to Family Service and Children's Aid, Henry Ford Addiction Recovery Center, and Lifeways. There were 16 rides provided to MOUD services at the Victory Clinic in Jackson. The transportation specialist assisted in the release of 9 total individuals directly from the Jackson County Jail & Hillsdale County Jail and transported them to SUD treatment facilities. Roads 2 Recovery also purchased 10 Reserve-A-Ride tickets to help a new mother and her babies get rides to her MOUD and IOP appointments. Also, they distributed 42 one-way bus passes. Out of 85 rides requested, they were able to provide 76 rides total.
	2	Community Recovery Initiative	This provider continued to make significant progress in advancing the Community Recovery Initiative. They developed a series of comprehensive Recovery Coach and Speaker Training modules, along with corresponding PowerPoint presentations. These trainings focus on key recovery coaching principles and substance use disorder (SUD) topics that will benefit both staff and the broader community. The goal is to equip peers and recovery coaches with the skills and confidence needed to facilitate these trainings and presentations independently. During June, two trainings were scheduled for separate dates in July. Outreach efforts are underway to fill all available training slots. In addition, they conducted one community outreach presentation at Jackson Interfaith Shelter. The presentation included: An overview of community SUD resources, information on programs and services, and an interactive question-and-answer segment. Through this outreach event, they successfully engaged 11 community members. To further strengthen community engagement efforts, they have developed a strategic plan to regularly attend and participate in City Council and County Commissioner meetings. They are scheduled to be placed on the City Council agenda in September 2026, which was the earliest available opportunity. They also remain actively involved in coalitions and collaborative efforts with local leaders to advocate for SUD resources and identify opportunities to bridge service gaps. During this reporting period, they met with a 12th District Court Judge to discuss opportunities to address service gaps within District Court. They are also in the process of scheduling meetings and presentations with the local Prosecutor's Office and Public Defender's Office.

Huron, Saginaw, Tuscola	1	Transportation	During the month of June, this provider's transportation program reached an exciting milestone by meeting their goal of transporting 5–10 recoverees per month per contractor for the first time since the program began. They are encouraged by this progress because it shows that their outreach efforts are working and that more individuals in their rural communities are becoming aware of this important resource. Getting the word out has taken time and persistence. Throughout the month, they increased social media outreach, shared transportation flyers at recovery meetings, and promoted the program through the Tuscola County Connections app, reaching more than 1,000 county residents. They are beginning to see those efforts pay off. Huron County experienced increased utilization, Saginaw County remained steady, and Tuscola County saw an increase in first-time participants accessing transportation services. One accomplishment they are especially proud of this month involved a participant receiving Medication-Assisted Recovery (MAR) services. She was facing the possibility of discontinuing treatment because she had no reliable transportation to her appointments. Through the Rural Recovery Transportation program, she was able to continue treatment until she obtained her own transportation, removing a significant barrier and allowing her to focus on her continued recovery instead of worrying about how she would get to treatment. Transportation also continues to create opportunities for connection within the broader recovery community. One participant attended a recovery meeting outside of their home county for the first time and shared that seeing recovery thriving in another community gave them renewed hope for their own recovery journey. Participants continue to express gratitude for the support this program provides. Gas cards have also become a valuable resource, helping individuals who have access to a vehicle but need assistance with fuel costs continue accessing recovery-related services and supports.
