	1	Peer Recovery Coach in the Jail	During the month of July, 30 individuals were seen by the peer recovery coach in the jail, clients' home, or community settings. Three people were opened to the RSAT program. One individual was released from jail and psychiatrically hospitalized within 4 days after a suspected return to use despite intensive efforts by staff to intervene in preventing the hospitalization. Another individual was reincarcerated after 9 days at home and a return to use. Two individuals returned to the community after completing substance use residential treatment after jail and two others went from jail to the community. One individual was placed in substance use residential treatment. Overall, they continue to see high numbers of individuals with children and individuals addressing longtime health concerns upon release from jail.

	1	Media Campaign	In July, the SUD anti-stigma Celebrating Strength campaign expansion continued with Redhead Creative Consultancy. The first expansion phase with the individual in recovery from Midland had all the toolkit outreach sent out, and radio ads wrapped at the end of July. The billboards and OTT ads continue through the end of August. The next expansion phase with the women in recovery from Cass City and Jackson had all the media go live, and it is running through the end of September. The toolkits are on track for delivery in mid-August.

	1	Street Medicine Program Development	During July, this provider continued building the infrastructure necessary to launch Street Medicine services in the Bay and Saginaw region. They prepared a dedicated outreach vehicle for deployment to the Saginaw team which will include a day of outreach in Bay. Having a dedicated vehicle in place will support outreach activities and improve the team's ability to provide mobile services throughout the region. In addition, staff began preparing to deliver educational programs to college students. This included meeting with the Community Education team to discuss program implementation, becoming familiar with the presentation materials, and attending trainings led by experienced staff to build knowledge and confidence in program delivery. They also shadowed both the HCV and Harmless teams to gain hands-on experience with outreach strategies, client engagement, and service delivery in the field. This provider has also found an office space with hopes of it being ready to use in a month. There were also 500 resource envelopes assembled and 20 of those were delivered to Bay Arenac Behavioral Health staff.

Jackson	1	Transportation	This provider's transportation program provided 123 rides to 19 unique individuals. Of those rides, they transported 6 individuals directly to SUD residential treatment such as Sacred Heart in Richmond, Hope House in Jonesville, and Meridian Health Services in Waterford. The transportation specialist assisted in the release of 3 individuals directly from the Jackson County Jail and Hillsdale County Jail and transported them to SUD treatment facilities. They provided 9 rides to mental health services at Lifeways and local recovery meetings in Jackson. They provided 47 rides to intensive outpatient services to Family Service and Children's Aid, Henry Ford Addiction Recovery Center, and Lifeways. They provided 60 rides to MOUD services at the Victory Clinic in Jackson, including routine doctors' visit with the MOUD provider. They assisted in a successful transition from residential treatment to recovery housing, Randy's House in Greenville. Also, this program distributed 71 one-way bus passes for local city transportation in Jackson County to assist participants across more means of transportation. Out of 132 rides requested, they were able to provide 123 rides in total.
	2	Community Recovery Initiative	During the month of July, this provider gained significant momentum in advancing their Community Recovery Initiative. They delivered two comprehensive training modules during July. The first training, ROSC (Recovery-Oriented Systems of Care) and the Peer Recovery Coach's Role, was presented to six Peer Recovery Coaches. This training focused on strengthening participants' understanding of recovery-oriented systems and the vital role peer recovery coaches play in supporting individuals on their recovery journey. The second training module "The Real Story: Mental Health, Substance Use Disorder, and Why Stigma Reduction Matters" was delivered to seven Peer Recovery Coaches. This training provided education on the intersection of mental health and substance use disorders while emphasizing the importance of reducing stigma to improve recovery outcomes and community engagement. In addition to these training efforts, this provider conducted an outreach presentation at the Medical Control Meeting, reaching approximately 30 individuals, including law enforcement personnel, EMS professionals, firefighters, and other first responders from local public safety agencies. The presentation included an introduction to and overview of the community referral form for substance use disorder services, information on community-based SUD resources, an overview of this provider's programs and services, educational content that addresses stigma reduction and increasing awareness surrounding substance use disorder and recovery, and an interactive question-and-answer session that allowed attendees to discuss challenges, resources, and opportunities for collaboration. This provider continues to strengthen its community engagement efforts and remains committed to its strategic plan of connecting with local leaders through participation in City Council and County Commissioner meetings. They have been placed on the agenda for a City Council meeting in September, providing an additional opportunity to educate community stakeholders about recovery support services and substance use disorder resources.

	1	Transportation	During the month of July, this transportation program continued to make meaningful progress in reducing transportation barriers for individuals seeking recovery support services. In Tuscola County, the program continues to grow, with participants utilizing transportation to attend recovery meetings and recovery-focused events. They are also seeing participants transition off the service as intended once they secure reliable transportation of their own. Several individuals shared how grateful they were to have temporary transportation available while their vehicle situations were being resolved. In Huron County, program awareness and utilization continue to increase. One first-time participant shared, "I think it's cool that the person driving me to the event is someone in recovery too! He could relate to a lot of what I have been through. I never felt judged that I had to ask for a ride." This feedback highlights the value of having Peer Recovery Coaches provide transportation, creating opportunities for both connection and support. Saginaw County experienced a temporary interruption in services when their independent contractor was no longer able to provide transportation after July 14. Prior to that transition, transportation utilization had remained fairly steady. They were able to identify and onboard a new independent contractor, who will begin providing transportation services on August 1. Overall, the program continues to provide short-term transportation that helps individuals access recovery supports while working toward long-term transportation solutions.
